


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Signed Beauties Of Costume Jewelry: Identification & Values

This book would make a cute coffee table book with it's many photos, but it is an entirely useless reference to collectors and dealers such as myself. The book is broken into different designers/companies such as Trifari. A brief history is given for each, but all relevant information pertaining to their most notable and collectible styles, how value is determined, and what is most valuable, is missing. There is no information explaining how the author determines her values, just values for her presented pieces. There is little information on which styles or pieces to keep an especial eye out for (E.G. the highly collectible Trifari Jelly Belly Poodle) that are most valuable. And many styles and popular designers are not mentioned at all. Most annoying and unacceptable is the author does not depict the back of a single piece, or a photo of a single signature or stamp! I was shocked to find the signatures (which vary over time and play an important role in the value of a piece) are poorly described and not portrayed. This book does not strike me as a professional resource - it strikes me as a collector showing off her personal collection and favorite pieces, and bragging about what she believes them to be worth. She sounds like a nitwit, and her values are a joke.
