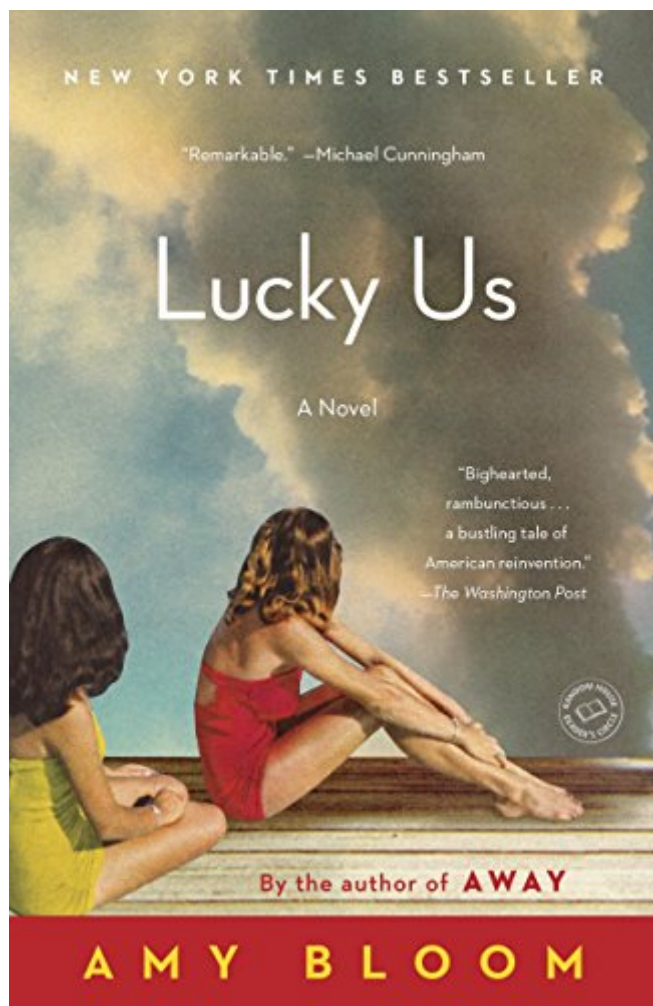

There are as many characters in this book as there are reasons to recommend reading it. It had several separate stories within the story that made me sad when each story ended as in Gus's life with his new family in Germany and Edgar's beautiful jazz singer lover. I could have read a whole book just about her. The life of the two sisters, Eva and Iris was one rough road with a series of unfortunate events to rival the Kennedy's but through it all, the many characters and supporting cast as well as the strong if unusual relationships they build along the way are what make them lucky indeed!

As a long-time Amy Bloom fan, I was very excited to read her latest book. She is an incredibly gifted writer -- the language and sentence structure is always spot on. Line by line, Lucky Us is perfect. As always, her characters are complete people with all the fixings to make them human. But I felt as

though the book fell a bit flat in parts. It was a good read, but not as pleasingly deep and enjoyable as her short stories or *Away*.

And lucky anyone who lets Eva, Iris, Gus, Edgar, Francisco, Danny, Reenie and Clara into their world. And a few others, too. As Eva said of herself and Danny, what a pair. What a wonderful book about how love evolves, if we only let it. Thank you, Amy Bloom.

I was surprisingly pleased with this story. It didn't try to sugar coat the challenges of the Amish people in the story, nor try to minimize the difficulties of the various personalities with shortcomings in the community where they live.

Normally, I enjoy Amy Blooms books but "Lucky Us" was a problem. I both cared and didn't care about the characters. Often I thought them contrived. I felt the same about the plot. Portions felt lifted from other books -- the abandoned by its mother child finding refuge with an eccentric womanizing Dad, a half sister turned lesbian/actress. Just didn't work for me in total, altho parts did

I enjoyed this book so much. There were complex family relationships, but with a good ending.

A great story about a plucky young lady who makes lemonade out of lemons and comes out the big winner.
