

Rick Steves has spent 100 days every year since 1973 exploring Europe. Rick produces a public television series (Rick Steves' Europe), a public radio show (Travel with Rick Steves), and an app and podcast (Rick Steves Audio Europe); writes a bestselling series of guidebooks and a nationally syndicated newspaper column; organizes guided tours that take thousands of travelers to Europe annually; and offers an information-packed website (RickSteves.com). With the help of his

hardworking staff of 80 at Europe Through the Back Door—in Edmonds, Washington, just north of Seattle—Rick's mission is to make European travel fun, affordable, and culturally broadening for Americans.Irish-American Pat O'Connor first journeyed to Ireland in 1981, and was hooked by the history and passion of the feisty Irish culture. Frequent return visits led to his partnership with Rick Steves and his work as a tour guide and coauthor of this book. Pat loves all things Hibernian (except the black pudding) and thrives on the adventures that occur as he annually slogs the bogs in search of new Irish travel discoveries.

Rich Steve guides are the very best for Europe. They have true reviews, telling you if something that is supposed to be great is actually boring, and directing you to the really terrific stuff that is not well known. His museum guides are unequalled. He walks you through each important piece with details and tells you when to skip a room. I looked at some places he said to skip and he was right. You will not find a better guide.

This guide book was extremely helpful as I traveled around Dublin on a brief visit. What to see and where to find what seemed most important and interesting is clearly explained. Maps were very clear, too, and, as always, Rick Steves, shows the reader how to save money and still have a wonderful visit. I found the section on the National Library especially worthwhile, as a great William Butler Yeats exhibit has been installed since my last Ireland trip 20 years ago.

Used this to help plan trip to Ireland. Enjoy his books. The Kilmainham Jail is a must-see and is covered in this book, and my friend tells me that it wasn't in some of the other books he read about Dublin.

I will only be in Dublin for a few days which is why I wanted the "snapshot" Dubin version of Rick Steves' Ireland, as I knew I would not have time to explore more than Dublin.
