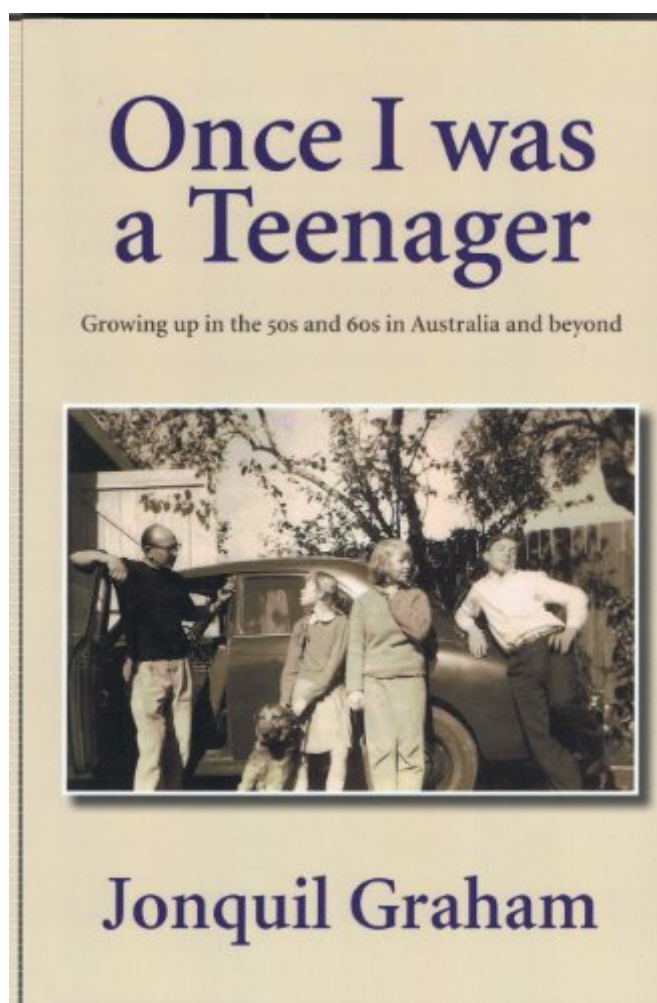


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Once I Was A Teenager: Growing Up In The 50s And 60s In Australia And Beyond

I have just finished reading Jonquil Graham's spellbinding book ONCE I WAS A TEENAGER. If you

But I gave it a chance. It just never really grabbed me. I did enjoy the stories of the parents, how they made up funny words, the mother's propensity for drama, their homelife with all the zany experiences the children had. For me the story felt condensed, incomplete. I'd get confused with the shuffling around, I'd be in the midst of an adventure, which would abruptly end, and then another would start, and I'd flip back thinking I must have missed part of the first. Each little story had a ton of promise, but she never really "went there". Just when I started getting intrigued I'd be thrown into the middle of a new story. Towards the end, on her hippie excursion (which I never would have lasted through one hour much less all the months she did) I was just wanting to get to the last page. Another annoyance was the constant use of the Aussie slang, which while I realize she IS Australian, made the reading a bit difficult for me. After a while I just kind of gave up.

I enjoyed the book for all the reasons mentioned in previous reviews. I also enjoyed Johnquil's travels on ships and hitching. The descriptions and details made me feel like I was with her the entire way.

Whatever, many of us old codgers need to take the time and make the effort to leave a testimony of our own lifetime experiences for the next generations, so that they, too, may have some understanding of what made us tick, and what we experienced growing up in difficult times and before the electronic age to such a firm hold on the very way we live today. Hats off to Jonquil--I would have loved to have an opportunity to meet her in person, just to hear her express herself in her own "dialect"... g'day!

The beginning of this book is very interesting and well written, but author gets bogged down later in the story. The many traveling experiences may have precipitated the future desire for adoption, but just seemed to be so repetitious that I lost interest and found myself skipping over. That being said, it is interesting to note the similarities between growing up in the US in the 50s-60s and that of Oz.

My family emigrated to Australia in the mid 60's and for quite a long time now I had been searching for a book that would bring back memories of my life in those early years. I came across *Once I was a Teenager* by accident and decided to read it even though the time frame was not quite what I was looking for.
