This is a wonderful book about the flotsam and jetsam of 1960s pop culture, the carbon copy

detritus that washed up on the shore in the wake of Batman, Bond, the Beatles, and UNCLE.All these are present, represented as jumping-off points, but the joy is in the detail of the tsunami of imitations that followed. As such, you wonâ Â™t find much of Weisinger and Swanâ Â™s Superman Family, no Star Trek, and very little of Lee and Kirby. Apart from Batman (the book is dedicated to Adam West), who rightly gets extensive coverage, Irwin Allen, and a nod to Bond and UNCLE, the big boys take a back seat. What you will find is all the glorious junk that the imitators and bandwagon jumpers turned out in their wake, piles and piles of opportunist tat like Captain Nice, Mr. Terrific, Batfink, Super Chicken, Secret Squirrel, and all the other cash-ins and rip-offs from the comics companies, toymakers, and TV producers trying to get in on the super-hero and spy fads. And oddly, that is the joy of this book. Cringe as you see Goofy become a super-hero. Wince as you see Archie become a spy. This stuff is fascinating and deserves its fifteen minutes. But itâ Â™s not just about the bizarre rubbish (which, I might add, is documented with admirable objectivity, there $\tilde{A}$ ¢ $\hat{A}$   $\hat{A}^{TM}$ s no Golden Turkey-style sneering; there $\tilde{A}$ ¢ $\hat{A}$   $\hat{A}^{TM}$ s also no attempt to elevate trash to treasure). There are some jewels among the fake paste \$\tilde{A}\circ \tilde{A}\$ and \$\tilde{A}\$ the wonderful Johny Quest is in there, as is the Green Hornet and Sterankoâ Â™s Nick Furv, and thereâ Â™s excellent coverage of the Hanna-Barbera super-heroes, the Filmation DC cartoons, and the syndicated Marvel Super-Hero shows, the last of which  $I\tilde{A}c\hat{A} \hat{A}^{TM}ve$  been featuring in my own Naked Pulp title. The Saturday morning cartoons are rarely given their due, but they are here. Subjects such as the 1960s Spider-Man and the Hanna-Barbera Fantastic Four cartoons rarely receive the attention they deserve, and I particularly enjoyed the feature on the Marvel and DC super-hero paperbacks, which  $I\tilde{A}\phi\hat{A}\hat{A}^{TM}$ ve had in my collection since the early  $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{A}\hat{A}^{TM}$ ve had in my coverage of before, anywhere. And author Michael Eury clearly knows and loves his subject (okay, I cringed when I saw Norman Felton given the credit for UNCLE, when all us UNCLE nuts know the real Man was Sam Rolfe, but as Michael clearly knows more about the Gold Key TV comics than I ever have, can, or will, I forgive him!). Nice to finally have a nameâ Â"George Wilsonâ Â"for the gorgeous Irwin Allen cover paintings for the Voyage and Time Tunnel comics. As is usually the case with TwoMorrows publications, the book is beautifully designed, and the illustrations are perfectly chosen. I leafed through it several times just enjoying the art and marvelling at the memories before I actually started cherrypicking pieces to read, just drinking in familiar and occasionally forgotten images. Part coffee table book, part reference work, if you are a 1960s pop culture fanatic like me, you cannot pass up this book for your library.
