


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Why I Don't Call Myself Gay: How I Reclaimed My Sexual Reality And Found Peace





Synopsis

Daniel Mattson once believed he was gay. Raised in a Christian family, and aware of attractions to other boys at age six, Mattson's life was marked by constant turmoil between his faith in God and his sexual attractions. Finding the conflict between his sexual desires and the teachings of his church too great, he assumed he was gay, turned his back on God, and began a relationship with another man. Yet freedom and happiness remained elusive until he discovered Christ and his true identity. In this frank memoir, Mattson chronicles his journey to and from a gay identity, finding peace in his true identity, as a man, made in the image and likeness of God. Part autobiography, part philosophy of life, and part a practical guide in living chastely, the book draws lessons from Mattson's search for inner freedom and integrity, sharing wisdom from his failures and successes. His lifelong search for happiness and peace comes full circle in his realization that, above all else, what is true about him is that he is a beloved son of God, loved into existence by God, created for happiness in this life and the next. Mattson's book is for anyone who has ever wondered who he is, why he is here, and, in the face of suffering, where to find joy, happiness, and the peace that surpasses all understanding.

Having known Dan for a number of years, I was tremendously excited upon the announcement of this release - and it does not disappoint. Dan is one of the few public speakers on the subject with the courage to express church teaching with clarity, while recognizing the struggle that accompanies living within that truth. Rather than pander to an audience looking for "gray areas", Dan's writing begins with a clear understanding of Catholic anthropology on the subject of same sex attraction, and then builds out from there to talk of how the Church welcomes men and women with this attraction, and invites them to full participation in the Liturgy, and in authentic Catholic living. This book is recommended not only for those trying to reconcile their faith and sexuality, but for anyone who wonders how they fit into today's Catholic Church.

This is Daniel's story. No one can censor him or tell him he is wrong or a bigot or a hater. For one thing, our sexuality is not our identity. It does not define us. We are in fact, so much more than our sexual desires. For another if sexuality and gender are "fluid"as the LGBTQ+ advocate might claim, then why could he not freely choose to not live out his desires without fear of backlash and scorn from his LGBTQ+ brothers and sisters who say they are so "inclusive". Daniel's story is one of bravery and he is an excellent story teller. We all have a right to tell our story lest we risk being like our Canadian brothers who can charged hate speech for advocating traditional marriage. That's not the kind of society we want, right?

Wow. I really, really loved this book. It wasn't what I expected; I thought it would be more of a memoir, but after a few chapters I realized it was going to be much deeper. It was full of references to scripture, the Catechism, and papal encyclicals, as well as some stellar writings from the likes of CS Lewis, Dietrich von Hildebrand, etc. Here is an individual who has been deeply introspective about his prior mistakes and unhappiness, and found a deep and lasting joy. Even if you disagree with him and everything the Catholic Church stands for, you have to admire his honesty. As a faithful, practicing Catholic, I happened to agree with him and the Catholic church's stance on homosexual behavior (as well as the Church's stance on other behaviors that violate our human

sexuality--it's important to point that out). Unfortunately, it appears that some of the other reviewers didn't understand the part where he discusses the Church's teachings, as well as the use of the word "disordered", which Dan takes extra pains to help the reader understand. I understand that there are a lot of people with a deep hatred and distrust of the Catholic Church, but at least try to have an open mind when reading this book, and really listen to what the author is trying to say! Finally, as a married woman who suffers from infertility, I was surprised how much I related to his struggles with sin, loneliness, and having difficulty recognizing God's love for us in the midst of our crosses. Truly a beautiful book, I'm so glad I read it.

This book is a must-read for any Catholic or Christian. LGBTQA+ is the issue of our time, and Dan speaks as someone who has lived BOTH sides - the out and proud versus the chaste and Catholic. Dan gives a well-reasoned, measured response to reclaiming our sexual identities as children of God, first and foremost. He tried gay and found it wanting. You don't have to be gay, you weren't born that way, and Dan shares his story. This is not a judgmental, "pray the gay away" message. This is a loving, theological, and REAL story of how one man found meaning, purpose, reason, and love in his identity as a beloved child of God. We all need to find our identities in this, "gay" or "straight." This is a must-read, whether you struggle with same sex attraction or not. Thank you, Dan, for your courage and honesty in sharing your life and wisdom with us.

I highly recommend this book to young people who experience same sex attraction. Daniel Matson spoke about his new book: Why I Don't Call Myself Gay. He talked about being a young man and wondering what plans God had for him. Jeremiah 29:11 was always on his mind: For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. He said that anybody who struggles with same sex attraction should be in the Catholic Church because it's the safest place to be, where you can recognize your dignity as a child of God. He quotes one of my favorites verses John 10:10: I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly. That's what the Church offers. It helps people with same sex attraction to carry this cross of suffering and unite it to Christ's. It's a book about being chaste (which is for everybody!) in all stages of your life, whether single, married, divorced, widowed.

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
