


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The Cambridge Encyclopedia Of The English Language

The Cambridge Encyclopedia of the English Language is one of the publishing phenomena of recent times. The length of the book has increased by 16 pages and there are 44 new illustrations, extensive new material on world English and Internet English, and a complete updating of statistics, further reading suggestions and other references.

Good introduction to linguistics, overall, and the study of the English Language, in particular. Crystal covers the development of human language, starting with the sound producing organs and the range of sounds that humans can make, then goes into the development of the language(s) of Great Britain starting with the earliest known inhabitants, progressing through successive invasions, mass borrowings as England became the world's pre-eminent power, and then the continuing development of English as a universal language for science, business and general use as a "high status" language. He also devotes a good amount of space to exploring dialects, accents, pidgins and creole languages. As he notes, a linguist does not judge whether a particular usage is "correct." Rather, the linguist merely studies and reports on how a language is being used by its speakers.

Writers can't learn enough about global English. This is a good reference, too.

First thing I need to say is that this book is an overview of English Language and designed for average intelligent adults, not for serious academic settings. You'll notice plenty of photographs, charts, and such. It's quite fun to flip to any page and just start reading. It included a lot of contemporary figures, like pop singers, current politicians, and authors. It tried to make readers understand the older form of English culture by linking the current one to it. I must say this approach worked only so far as to get your feet wet. Again, it's an introductory sort of book, but still has many things we modern citizens don't know about English.

Many hours of enjoyable browsing await you. If you have a love of the English language and

curiosity about its peculiarities, you will find it fascinating, even if you too occasionally mangle the language!
